Dynamic Shakespeare for Students

This interactive on your feet workshop will shed light on how and why Shakespeare is important to our modern lives and how to use the text to aid the student when they approach the text in their English Literature class.

Why does Shakespeare use both verse and prose? What does the rhythm of the verse actually tell us about the characters or what is going on in the play (if anything?) How do we know we are interpreting Shakespeare the right way? Is there, indeed, a 'right' way?

These and other questions will be explored in this lively and informative workshop.

Spend the first part of the workshop discovering the clues and cues that Shakespeare has written into his texts and apply your new-found knowledge to your understanding of a short scene in one of the plays. See where your thoughts, understandings and ideas line up – and where your interpretations diverge!
